The Snyder Complex is a series of multi-component localities situated on landscapes adjacent to the Delaware River in the river basin's mid-section. The oldest of the occupations (Paleoindian cultural period) date to approximately 13,000 years ago in New Jersey. Over 30 fluted Paleoindian projectile points or bifaces have been reported from surface and buried, stratified contexts.
